




A Message From Our Town Manager




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### Town Government Shaping FY2024 Budget, Residents to Vote in June



The Gray Town Council carefully weighs budget requests from each Town department as they shape the FY2024 budget.

February to April of every year is an auspicious time for Town Government when Town staff and the Town Council discuss various financial requests from Town departments and distill them into a thoughtful, measured budget for Gray residents to consider for approval. This year, the budget for fiscal year 2024 (which goes from June 2023 to July 2024) is currently on the table, and you can watch the entire process and submit your own budget feedback to your elected officials.

Our website has a <u>page</u> that describes the Town of Gray's budget agenda, and which topics are discussed at each workshop meeting. There are a variety of subjects brought before the Town Council by Town departments during these workshops, including stipends, staffing proposals and reorganizations, technology requests, capital improvement plans, committee updates, and more.

## Town Government Shaping FY2024 Budget, Residents to Vote in June (Continued)

"The Council views presenting a budget to the residents on Election Day as one of the most critical jobs assigned to the body," says Town Council Chair Sandy Carder. "We're proud that Gray has one of the most transparent and accessible budget processes."

By having such a robust budget workshop schedule, the Town Council can view all requests and determine if they should be addressed in the current budget cycle, or in future years. Keeping the MILL rate – the amount of tax payable per dollar of the assessed value of a property – as stable as possible is the Council's goal. Too high a municipal budget in any particular year can have a negative effect on the MILL rate; school district budgets and county budgets, which the Town Council does not control, can have an impact on Gray's MILL rate, too. Through careful planning and controlled spending, the Town Council has kept Gray's property tax rate nearly flat in the last four years.

Much thought goes into how to craft a responsible budget. It's common practice for a municipal government to use bond funding for major capital projects, and lease-purchase funding to finance vehicle purchases for public works equipment and public safety apparatus. Using these financial tools spreads out the cost of purchase and ownership and flattens spikes in Gray's year-to-year expense budgeting.

"Gray is fortunate to have seen an improvement in our bond rating this year, to Aa1 from Aa2," says Town Manager Nate Rudy. "The FY2024 initial budget request proposes a bond debt level of 8.8 percent of the total expenses, comfortably within the regular debt range of 5-15 percent used by municipal governments around the U.S."

Two of Gray's six current bonds will mature in 2024, which creates an opportunity for the Council to consider future uses of bonds and other financial tools to make necessary investments in Town infrastructure while maintaining a stable MILL rate for property owners.

Near the end of the budget agenda, residents will have the opportunity to make their thoughts known at the Town Council meeting on April 4, 2023. Finally, Gray residents will vote on the Town budget.

"We encourage everyone to get out to the polls in June to vote," says Carder. "It represents not only how Gray will function in the next year, but also the months-long efforts of dozens of dedicated public servants who want to see Gray grow and thrive."

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## Nomination Papers Now Available for Town Councilor, MSAD Board of Directors, Water District

Are you or someone you know interested in pursuing public office in the Town of Gray? Nomination papers are available, beginning Tuesday, February 28, 2023, for the following offices:

- **Gray Town Councilor**: Two 3-year terms to expire June 2026.
- **MSAD 15 Board of Directors**: Two 3-year terms to expire June 2026, one remainder of a 3 -year term to expire June 2025.



Interested in public service? Consider serving your town!

• Water District Trustee: One 5-year term to expire June 2028.

- Open Space Committee: Makes recommendations to the Town

- <u>Planning Board</u>: Reviews and approves subdivision plans, site plans, conditional uses, and Shoreland Zoning applications in accordance with State Statutes and Town Ordinances.
- <u>Resiliency Committee</u>: Promotes climate action planning and influences the path our community will take toward climate resilience, energy efficiency, waste management and renewable energy.
- <u>Zoning Board of Appeals Committee</u>: Hears and decides administrative appeals where it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination by the Code Enforcement Officer.
- MSAD15 School Board: Shapes the functioning of the Gray-New Gloucester school system.
- <u>Recreation Committee</u>: Advises and recommends to the Town Council on recreational and public parks matters, such as: programs, policies, development, and leisure time activities.
