Repairs to the Dry Mills Schoolhouse continue during this winter season.

Work on the platform and vapor barrier are complete with the majority of the subfloor work done as well.

Merry Movers returned to the site to lower the building back onto the platform and will be removing



the rest of their equipment shortly. This will allow the Carpenter to finish sealing up the subfloor and allow interior work to begin.



This Spring you may notice a few banners up on street poles around town, featuring the words "Explore Gray". The banners are part of a campaign to invite residents and visitors alike to explore Gray. The banners are part of a promotional campaign headed by the <u>Community & Economic</u> <u>Development Committee (CEDC).</u>

The Explore Gray theme invites members of our community to get out and about this Spring season and it welcomes people to visit our town to explore our businesses, places of natural interest and historic sites. "We want people to get out, walk about and enjoy Gray in 2020!" says Eliza Watson of Gray and chair of the CEDC.

The committee hopes that the Banner Project will generate a sense of place in town and attract community sponsors. The Committee aims to have clusters of banners installed at the gateways to the Village District at Yarmouth Road, Main Street and Shaker Rd, then also at Libby Hill Road, and Shaker Rd around that intersection. However, this Spring they are

starting out with twelve banners. To reach their coverage goal of forty-seven CEDC welcomes members of the community members to sponsor the installation.

This seasonal banner design, was created in house by the CEDC and funded in part by both their budget and community donations. 


Have you used Recyclopedia yet? Recyclopedia is a one stop shop for all your questions about recycling and solid waste. Please check it out!

THE 3 DAY ROLLER COASTER: 8 Week

Only need a few days per week? No problem! Join us any three days of the week for the whole summer. From time to time you may need an additional day, that's ok too! Add on days will be charged at \$65/day. 7:00am-5:30pm

SINGLE SPLASH: Single Week Option

Need a couple of weeks here and there? A single week of care includes field trip or special event, a t-shirt, and a trip for an ice cream treat. Camp runs from 8:00am-4:00pm. Before and after care is available for \$15/day 7:00am Drop-off, 5:30pm pick-up
