I'm happy to report the Town Manager search is going well, and there are a few candidates in the running. More information will be shared when available, but I'm confident we will




have a new permanent Town Manager in the coming months – and you all will have a chance to meet this individual, whoever it ends up being – before they take the position. Community input is vital to this selection process.

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## Impactful Town of Gray Employee Retires After 31 Years

The Town of Gray can only function as well as its staff, and nowhere is that seen more clearly than Dean Bennett, who is retiring from Town service after an incredible 31 years.

Dean is retiring from his position as Gray's Parks and Facilities Supervisor, a far-reaching job that has taken him to all corners of Gray. In the first 29 years of his career, he was the Town's Director of Recreation, and thus was involved in many changes that have come to Gray, including, but certainly not limited, to:

- The revitalization of Newbegin Gym from a nearlycondemned state to the multi-purpose recreation facility it is today
- Installing and maintaining new athletic fields, such as the volleyball and basketball courts near the Town Office
- Cleaning up and improving the area near Wilkies Beach, so that it may be an accessible, relaxing, and safe destination for Gray residents

"Many of these businesses were visited by me asking for donations and not once did they say no. Now that's trust and community spirit."

In his more than three decades of service, Dean worked alongside six town managers, about a dozen G-NG athletic directors, and countless Town staff.

Dean is known for his hard work ethic, and that personality trait shined brightly when he first started working for Gray.

"The first 10 years were labor-intensive, what with starting new programs, making improvements to infrastructure, and getting to know the community," Dean says. "Being a divorced father with three young boys, I had many weekend activities/ events and the three of them all tagged along, with the youngest on my hip. I really wanted to create a recreation department I could be proud of."

What does it take to help build a successful recreation department and maintain a great relationship with your co-workers over three decades? Looking at Dean's work history and reputation among the community, he clearly has the answer.

"Being approachable to your staff and your constituents is key, as is working hard, being firm with your convictions, and having a great sense of humor," Dean says.

As he parts ways from his professional relationship with the Town of Gray, Dean seems to know exactly what he wants to do in his retirement.

"I'm going to spend time with family and my new grandchild, work on some longstanding projects at home, and sleep in and make time for lots of fly fishing."

Hutchings, Andrew Constantine, and Dustin Carroll, among others.

"Nothing quite prepares you for getting that call that unbalances you. For me, it was Mike Poirier from Cumberland County Dispatch (911) telling me that Field was pinned under a tree in our back woods but was going to be ok, rescue was on the way to him. Mike let me know how Field was doing, who was on the way, what to expect once I got to Gloucester Hill Road, and kept me focused on getting home safely. Mike was my first hero of what was a very long day.

Field has two broken bones in his lower right leg. Surgery happened Sunday afternoon at Maine Medical Center. And he's back home in a splint cast and crutches. And a lot of hanging out for the next two months.

That is the extent of his injuries due to the immediate response from our New Gloucester Community. With Field's call to Mike at 911, they were able to guide the New Gloucester medical crew to his location in the woods. (Yay for cell phones and carrying them!) Everyone who was needed and might be needed came without hesitation. Field received excellent medical attention from the rescue team while

under the tree. He had a crew figuring out how to get the tree off him. His rescuers pulled him up a steep embankment in a sled and put him on a UTV. From there it was up the path to the waiting ambulance who whisked him away.

Field and I cannot begin to thank our larger community enough for being heroes. While everyone might say they were just doing their jobs, it is really much more than that. Field and I both received kindness, reassurance, and professional attention from all the rescue team, starting with the call to 911. Our neighbors and friends were there to help coordinate getting the tractor up from the woods, the Jeep put away, and our pets well-comforted while we were gone. They too, were there simply to help in any way they could.

It has been incredible to be on the receiving end of such professional service, generosity, and genuine care for us both. We feel extraordinarily lucky to live amongst all of you as neighbors and friends. You all are our heroes. Thank you.

# Town of Gray Now Uses Microsoft Teams for Public Meetings

To enhance our virtual meeting experience while optimizing costs, the Town of Gray is transitioning from Zoom to Microsoft Teams for all our public and non-public virtual meetings.

This positive change means any virtual meetings members of the public have with Town staff will be held via Microsoft Teams. All hybrid meetings that normally utilize Zoom for remote participation, such as Town Council meetings and Planning Board meetings, will now use Microsoft Teams.

If you click on a meeting link, such as the ones posted on all our public meeting agendas, you can either join the meeting as a guest straight from your web browser, or join via the Microsoft Teams application if you have it installed on your computer.

# Veterans Now Don't Need Specific License Plate to Receive Excise Tax Exemption

Did you know that, historically, veterans must switch to a disabled veteran's plate to receive a vehicle excise tax exemption? However, knowing that many veterans prefer to keep their existing plates, the Maine Bureau of Motor Vehicles is collaborating with the Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services (MBVS) to make veterans eligible for the excise tax exemption, as per <u>36 M.R.S. §</u> <u>1483(12)</u>, regardless of their chosen registration plate.

The Maine Bureau of Veterans' Services can help determine eligibility for motor vehicle excise tax exemption; you'll just need proof of total, service-connected disability in the form of a Department of Veterans Affairs benefit summary letter. These letters are provided to veterans in the springtime by the VA, at any time via ebenefits.va.gov, or by calling 800-827-1000. MBVS, which you can reach at 207-287-7020, may also have access to summary letters for certain veterans.

- <u>Zoning Board of Appeals Committee</u>: Hears and decides administrative appeals where it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination by the Code Enforcement Officer.
- MSAD #15 School Board: Shapes the functioning of the Gray-New Gloucester school system.
- <u>Recreation Committee</u>: Advises and recommends to the Town Council on recreational and public parks matters, such as: programs, policies, development, and leisure time activities.
