Town of Gray 2023 Year in Review

It's been quite a year for the Town of Gray, and as we are about to turn the page on 2023, let's look back at memorable moments from the past 12 months.

March – The public [first walked](#) the site of the recently extended [Village Area Loop Trail](#). The extension of the popular walking trail into the “gateway” property is the result of dedicated Town staff, cooperative contractors, and public input. Opening this extension was a year-long effort, and the Town recently celebrated the completion of the extension with a [ceremony](#), which you can watch on our YouTube channel.

June – This year's June election saw, among other things, one Town Councilor re-elected, a new Councilor join the leadership team, and the Town's proposed FY24 budget voted down. This rejection of the budget meant voters convened at a Town Meeting in September to [pass a new budget](#).

June – The Town of Gray relaunched its [YouTube channel](#), which now provides accessible content about Town business and community events. The channel is a home for meeting recordings of the Town Council, Zoning Board of Appeals, Planning Board, select School Board meetings, [Gray Community Television](#) content, and public forums.



July – The Town released its comprehensive [Older Adult Resource Guide](#) (pictured right), a valuable tool for older adults and their families, offering a wide range of resources and services that may be beneficial to their well-being. July – Gray resident Mary Sweeney Underwood [was honored](#) with the prestigious Spirit of America Award and a corresponding sentiment from the Maine Legislature. The Gray Town Council recognized this outstanding achievement at their July 18, 2023, meeting. The Spirit of America Award is bestowed upon individuals who demonstrate exceptional dedication, generosity, and volunteerism within their communities.



August – The 7th annual Wild Blueberry Festival is a huge success, bringing 30 percent more people to Gray than last year's festival. More than 3,200 people celebrated community, local businesses, and the titular fruit together. Check out some photos from the event [here](#), and keep your calendar cleared for August 10, 2024!

August – Town Manager Nate Rudy [left his position](#) to join the U.S. Department of State. Josh Tiffany, the Gray Public Library's long-time director, [stepped up](#) to fill the gap Rudy left until a new permanent Town Manager can be found. As of December 2023, that search is still ongoing.

August – For the first time since 2005, a Maine Little League team played in the Little League World Series. The Gray-New Gloucester/Raymond team played two games before being knocked out—the first against Seattle on August 17, and then Media, Pennsylvania on August 19. It was incredible seeing the G-NG/R community rally around the team during their successful season.

October – The Gray Historical Society celebrated the return of the [classic 1933 firetruck](#) to its

original station at One Main Street in Gray. The firetruck is now on display in a new enclosure, an addition made possible thanks to the community raising more than \$50,000.

November – The Gray Assessing Department held a food drive on Election Day. This drive brought in quite a few more donations than last year, and hundreds of dollars in cash donations, which helps the Gray Food Pantry. This Election Day also saw a huge turnout for an off-year election, with 2,689 people casting a vote. Even with the huge turnout, the election was run smoothly thanks to the efforts of election worker volunteers and the Town of Gray clerks.

November – A huge crowd came to the Town Office to celebrate the [annual lighting of the town's holiday tree](#). The tradition was complete with carolers from Gray-New Gloucester High School, and a visit by Santa.

Funding Available to Help Small Businesses

There are two new small business funding opportunities business owners should know.

Firstly, the Greater Portland Council of Governments is administering \$6 million in grants on behalf of the Maine Department of Economic and Community Development. The grants are open to businesses in pandemic-impacted industries across the state for activities that are directly related to increasing market reach and expanding sales activities. Secondly, \$500,000 in new pandemic relief funding is now available to small business and nonprofit organization owners in Cumberland County who started their business during the COVID-19 pandemic and have not received state or federal recovery funding to address economic impacts of the pandemic. - **Wild Blueberry Festival Committee:** Celebrates and promotes local businesses, community and school organizations, and the Pennell Complex.
- **Community Economic Development**

Committee: Promotes

community and cultural connections in Gray and supports established businesses.

- **Community Television Advisory Committee:** Makes recommendations regarding broadcast options for Gray, and recommends improvements to public, educational, and governmental programming.
- **Dry Mills School House Committee:** Preserves the rich history of the Dry Mills School House.
- **Open Space Committee:** Makes recommendations to the Town Council to help secure access to land/corridors through acquisitions, easements, land swaps, and other forms of agreements.
- **Planning Board:** Reviews and approves subdivision plans, site plans, conditional uses, and Shoreland Zoning applications in accordance with State Statutes and Town Ordinances.
- **Resiliency Committee:** Promotes climate action planning and influences the path our community will take toward climate resilience, energy efficiency, waste management and renewable energy.
- **Zoning Board of Appeals Committee:** Hears and decides administrative appeals where it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination by the Code Enforcement Officer.
- **MSAD #15 School Board:** Shapes the functioning of the Gray-New Gloucester school system.
- **Recreation Committee:** Advises and recommends to the Town Council on recreational and public parks matters, such as: programs, policies, development, and leisure time activities.
