

Massive Preserve in Gray Promotes Conservation, Recreation

The Royal River Conservation Trust has announced their first major project in Gray: the Thayer Brook Preserve.

The 147-acre space doubles the conservation and acreage behind the Gray-New Gloucester schools and features six beaver dams, a rich habitant for waterfowl, mountain biking

and hiking trails, a babbling brook, and more.

At their meeting on April 19, 2022, the Gray Town Council fully endorsed the preserve. Moreover, the preserve is supported conceptually by the Town of Gray's 2020 Comprehensive Plan and 2022 Open Space Plan.


"Thanks to the leadership of so many people, my hope is that the new Thayer Brook Preserve is the first of many projects by RRCT, alongside the Presumpscot Regional Land Trust, Maine Farmland Trust, the town, and others who are committed to conserving more of Gray's remaining farms, forests, and key recreational trails," said Councilor Anne Gass, a key leader in the town's recent open space planning process.

"Pollinator Party Planting Day"

Aims to Educate, Build Community

The volunteers who built Village Green, the park in Gray Village, are inviting you to join them for a planting day with educational opportunities, hands-on learning, and a special pollinator project!



Building parks is a great way to build community bonds and be social!

The gathering will begin at 9 a.m. on May 14 and

end at 12:45 p.m. Here are some of the activities planned for this event:

Soil works: Injecting compost extract into the growing areas to reboot the nutrient cycling capacity of soils. Living Soil Network will lead this activity.

Planting: There will be perennials to plant, and some annuals started from the seed of last year's plants.

Mulching: This group will have chop and drop cover crops, a seed mix for green mulch, plus some sheet mulching to do.

Transplanting: There will be some vining perennials to move and protect.

Tending: The group will weave willow fence and bolster berm.

Attendees should pack a good meal, bring a water vessel and gloves, wear sun protection, and invite a friend. There is parking at the Municipal Lot adjacent to the park and at Pennell Municipal Complex at 24 Main Street.

Team leaders are still needed for seedballs and sheet mulching. Please inquire with CEDC@graymaine.com or call 207-332-7224.

<u>Blueberry Festival Committee</u>: Celebrates and promotes local businesses, community and school organizations, and the Pennell Complex.

Community Economic Development Committee:

Promotes community and cultural connections in Gray and supports established businesses.



Community Television and Communications Advisory

<u>Committee</u>: Makes recommendations regarding broadcast options for Gray, and recommends improvements to public, educational, and governmental programming.

<u>Dry Mills School House Committee</u>: Preserves the rich history of the Dry Mills School House.

<u>Open Space Committee</u>: Makes recommendations to the Town Council to help secure access to land/corridors through acquisitions, easements, land swaps, and other forms of agreements.

<u>Planning Board</u>: Reviews and approves subdivision plans, site plans, conditional uses, and Shoreland Zoning applications in accordance with State Statutes and Town Ordinances.

<u>Resiliency Committee</u>: Promotes climate action planning and influences the path our community will take toward climate resilience, energy efficiency, waste management and renewable energy.

Zoning Board of Appeals Committee: Hears and decides administrative appeals where it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination by the Code Enforcement Officer.

<u>MSAD15 School Board</u>: Shapes the functioning of the Gray-New Gloucester school system.
