A Key Piece of Gray History, Restored

The Gray Historical Society recently celebrated the conclusion of a years-long project: the restoration of the Pennell Clock Face.

The iconic clock face had been absent from public view since 1992, when it was taken down during the clock's restoration. Thanks to the dedicated efforts of Don Whitney, member of the Gray Historical Society and Pennell School alum, and Doug



Webster of Gray's Community Development Office, the clock face is mounted in the Gray Town Hall, where it keeps time in unison with the building's other clock faces.

The Gray Historical Society estimates that the clock face has ticked more than 1.5 billion times since its purchase in the 1880s. Here's to 1.5 billion more ticks!

<u>Blueberry Festival Committee</u>: Celebrates and promotes local businesses, community and school organizations, and the Pennell Complex.

<u>Community Economic Development Committee</u>: Promotes community and cultural connections in Gray and supports established businesses.

<u>Community Television and</u> <u>Communications Advisory Committee</u>: Makes recommendations regarding broadcast options for Gray, and recommends improvements to public, educational, and governmental programming.



Dry Mills School House Committee:

Preserves the rich history of the Dry Mills School House.

Library Trustees: Adopts policies related to the library's operation and planning.

<u>Open Space Committee</u>: Makes recommendations to the Town Council to help secure access to land/corridors through acquisitions, easements, land swaps, and other forms of agreements.

<u>Planning Board</u>: Reviews and approves subdivision plans, site plans, conditional uses, and Shoreland Zoning applications in accordance with State Statutes and Town Ordinances.

Recreation and Conversation Committee: Advises and recommends recreational and public parks matters to the Town Council, such as programs, policies, development, planning, or leisure activities.

<u>Resiliency Committee</u>: Promotes climate action planning and related actionable items.

Zoning Board of Appeals Committee: Hears and decides administrative appeals where it is alleged there is an error in any order, requirement, decision, or determination by the Code Enforcement Officer.

Placemaking Event Helps Grow Village Green

The September 11 Placemaking Event at the Village Green was a great success, with community members coming out to help improve the space. They repositioned the raised beds and filled them, landscaped and seeded around the permeable parking lot, weeded and mulched the berm, built a trellis for the kiwi vine, painted the kiosk, mounted signs, and prepped an area for the Gray Historical Society to add their historical marker to the site. This month, the library is adding a mini-lending library to the park, as well.


GCTV—A Community Resource Brimming with Potential
